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### Introduction

An inference is a conclusion based on evidence and knowledge. This book teaches students what an inference is and how to make good inferences based on evidence and knowledge. It will also help students improve critical reading and higher level thinking skills. Before students begin making inferences, it is important to lead them through the brief lessons in the beginning of the book. Readers in grades one and two will become familiar with making inferences as they read.

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### The Importance of Identifying Evidence When Making an Inference

Evidence is information that proves or helps prove a claim or statement.

**Example**: Mary watched her mom go into each bedroom collecting clothes in a laundry basket. Her mom always collects clothes in a laundry basket before she puts them in the washing machine.

**Inference**: Mary inferred that her mom was going to wash clothes.
