

Consequently, Gary did his report on Jan van Eyck and explained that the Netherlands had a strong link to Italy, especially in trade and finance, so Renaissance art ideas that began in Italy easily spread to the Netherlands.

"Jan van Eyck used Renaissance ideas of naturalism and realism," Gary continued.

"He created three-dimensional space, figures in natural poses, and realistic backgrounds.

The masterpiece that he and his brother Hubert painted is an oil painting known as the Ghent Altarpiece, which hangs in the city of Ghent in the Flanders region in Belgium. This religious painting consists of twenty-four panels of various shapes that portray the Redemption of Man," explained Gary.

"Another famous painting by Jan van Eyck titled, 'The Arnolfini Marriage' is in the National Gallery of London. This famous oil painting shows a couple taking their marriage vows. Renaissance ideas are apparent in this painting with the dramatic use of light and shadow, the faces of the couple reflecting the emotional seriousness of the occasion, and the feeling of depth and perspective."
