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## **About This Book**

Advanced vocabulary words and their meanings are "caught" rather than "taught" through the activities in Crypt-O-Words. On each page, students are invited to guess a vocabulary word by looking for clues within the text or graphics at the top of the page. Then, the guess is confirmed, or the word determined, and students follow directions to solve a puzzle, cipher, or word game that reinforces the word's meaning. Activities promote multiple exposures to many advanced vocabulary words and incorporate famous quotes, science, historical references, analogies, and more.

Vocabulary enrichment has never been so engaging and fun!

## **Teaching Suggestions**

These enrichment activities may be used in many ways to supplement language arts and multidisciplinary instruction (see below). In the teacher notes you will find specific TIPS and HINTS for helping students when they're stumped and for extending learning. The goal is to make the learning fun and engaging so that students are challenged without feeling they are being tested. Encourage students to create their own Crypt-O-Word sets to enhance their vocabularies beyond the thirty words included in this book.

You might like to:

- implement a "Word of the Week" enrichment program
- offer these activities to students who would benefit from advanced vocabulary, perhaps as a form of differentiation for weekly classwork or homework
- create a center or bulletin board entitled Crypt-O-Words with copies of these pages for students to work on as they have time. Student-created Crypt-O-Words could be displayed here.




#### CLUES
