

Lesson 10: Correlative Conjunctions


Conjunctions are words that connect other words, phrases, or clauses. The most common are the coordinating conjunctions: *and*, *but*, and *or*. **Correlative conjunctions** come in pairs and are used together. They are diagrammed on either side of a dotted line connecting the nouns.

Correlative conjunctions: either/or, neither/nor, both/and, not only/but also


Either Joan **or** Jean will pick you up after practice.








- 1. Each sentence diagram below has an error. Diagram each sentence correctly.
